# CREWS BREAK GROUND ON FAIRVIEW EXPANSION. **BUILDING THE WAY TO A BETTER FUTURE**

After years of discussion and planning, Fairview is getting an addition that will address overcrowding and better prepare the school for the future. On Jan. 24, the School Board accepted construction bids, which were about \$300,000 less than expected. Crews broke ground about a month and a half after that, and since then, the progress on the west side of the building has been fast and furious. With the walls recently going up, the new footprint of the school is becoming visible.

The project includes four new classrooms with flexible furniture, an expansion of the multipurpose room with new a/v equipment, and the addition of storage in the back of the gym. With Fairview at capacity and enrollment expected to grow even more, the new classrooms and multipurpose room expansion alleviate crowding in the building. In addition, air conditioning will be installed in the gym, which the District decided to do at this time because duct work was already taking place and, therefore, the cost was reduced.

"It has been exciting for all of us at Fairview to watch this progress and envision the students who will be learning in the new classrooms that are already taking shape," says Fairview principal Dan Ophus. "Our current overcrowding forces us to use some small teaching spaces, or in some cases share spaces. I look forward to seeing the final product and knowing that all of our students are learning comfortably throughout the building."

The budgeted cost of the Fairview expansion is \$3.5 million, which is coming from referendum funds that were set aside in the 2018-2019 budget. Work will continue throughout the summer, with completion expected in time for the start of school.

Also this summer, the District will complete the following projects to address some of the most urgent needs that had been previously ignored due to lack of funds. The projects, which are part of the long-term Master Facilities Plan, are:

- LINCOLN Rebuild the service delivery ramp and crumbling retaining walls, an area that frequently floods. Estimated cost is \$270,000. Replace duct work for the HVAC system and repair rotted wood and aluminum window sills, each at an estimated cost of \$25,000.
- LIONS PARK Replace the outdated fire sprinkler system, at an estimated cost of \$250,000. Fairview sprinklers were replaced last summer. The District is delaying the project to rebuild the existing parking lot and build a lot on the newly purchased property by Lions Park, due to the discovery that the land elevations are not even, which presents a significant challenge. After consulting with the District architect and civil engineer, administrators determined it would be fiscally responsible to delay the project until next summer.
- WESTBROOK Improve the playground and add a bank of swings, to better meet the needs created by expanding enrollment. The cost is \$20,000, which will be shared by the PTO.
- ADMINISTRATION BUILDING Replace the HVAC system, which is original to the 1960s building and frequently malfunctions. Estimated cost is \$70,000.

#### ROBOTICS TEAM WINS WORLDWIDE HONORS, FOR LEARNING TO GROW SHRIMP IN SPACE

For the second year in a row, a Lincoln Robotics team won big at the World Robotics Championship, held April 24 to 27 in Detroit. The team, The Shrimp Strike Back, won the first place Innovative Solution Award, for creating a shrimp-growing tank to feed astronauts in long-duration space travel. The team competed against more than 17,000 students from around the world, also placing in the top six for project presentation, earning 17th place for robot performance and coming in fourth for best U.S. robot performance team. 


#### VFW HONORS SPECIAL LINCOLN TEACHER

## EDUCATION FOUNDATION CELEBRATES 20 YEARS OF GIVING BACK AND \$1.5 MILLION IN FUNDS RAISED FOR OUR SCHOOLS

In 1998, some District 57 parents decided to sell candy at a carnival to raise money for items the schools could not buy on their own. Little did they know that this small fundraiser would represent the launch of the District 57 Education Foundation and a legacy of giving back that would still be going strong two decades later.

The Education Foundation celebrated its 20th anniversary at the Great Gatsby Gala on April 6, raising more than \$44,000. This brings the Foundation's 20-year fundraising total to a whopping \$1.5 million.

"Everywhere you go in our schools you see examples of Education Foundation contributions – from very large items to a little smaller, but all incredibly important to student learning," says Elaine Aumiller, Ed.D., superintendent. "The District is so thankful to the current and past board members, donors, sponsors, volunteers...everyone who has been part of bringing the Foundation's mission to life over the past 20 years."

One of the first actions of the original Education Foundation was to adopt a Technology Plan that served as a blueprint for supporting the schools' early efforts to incorporate technology into learning. The Foundation provided computers for every classroom and partnered with a local company to wire the buildings for Internet access – a big deal in 1998!

Since then, the Foundation has hosted golf outings, trivia nights and spring galas to raise money to fund grant requests submitted by staff and parents, in the general areas of Curriculum Support, Technology and Wellness. The Foundation's efforts have grown, but its primary goal has stayed the same – to enable our community's children to take advantage of learning opportunities

that might not otherwise be available to them. The Foundation has provided funding for major projects, such as the renovation of the Westbrook LRC and Lincoln fitness center, and for items such as band and orchestra instruments, classroom books and PE equipment.

Mallory Reyes, current chair of the Foundation, says the money raised this spring enabled the funding of a wide range of grants that further the education and learning experiences of students at all four schools – the long list includes maker space materials, family literacy bags, art kit supplies, sensory equipment, flexible classroom seating and more.

"We are so fortunate to live in a community that values the education of our children," Reyes says.
