Principal's Message . . .

Dear Lincoln Families,

Last week I explained in this message that the Quarter 3 end-date and the Quarter 4 start-date were changed due to the District having to use emergency weather days (4 days so far and it's only early February). 3rd Quarter report cards will be distributed April 5.

Yesterday I sent the following message to parents and guardians of the Class of 2019: "Because four weather emergency days have extended the 2018/2019 school year, it is necessary to change the date for the Lincoln Middle School graduation. Graduation exercises will be held on Wednesday, May 29, 2019, at 7:00 pm in the Prospect High School Field House. (This is a change from May 22, 2019.)" THE LAST DAY FOR 8th GRADE STUDENT ATTENDANCE WILL BE TUESDAY, MAY 28, 2019.

Managing school calendars is always complicated when emergency days come into the equation. Decisions to extend quarters, adjust various event dates, and move graduation ahead by one week are made with great thought and consideration and I appreciate your flexibility and understanding.

Question: If my child is ill and will be home for several consecutive days, do I have to call the attendance line everyday?

Answer: YES! The attendance line is open 24 hours! Just dial 847.394.7350, Press 1. It is the responsibility of the school to account for each and every student daily. A student's absence must be reported to the school office by a parent or guardian.

The more timely information the front office has regarding your child's absence, the better we can ensure the safety and well-being of your child.



Question: Can I use the west parking lot to pick-up or drop-off my child?

Answer: No you may not. This lot is for staff and guest parking only. Bus traffic is



heavy at the start and end of the school day and **parent traffic is not allowed in the west lot**. Thank you for helping us to keep the kids safe.

Because so much of the way kids interact in the online world revolves around creating personal profiles and avatars, identity starts to take on a new meaning. If there's a large gap between an online and offline identity, it can fragment a kid's sense of self. <u>Common Sense Media</u> provides the following tips:

- Talk to your kids about anonymity.
- Remember that exploration is a part of growing up.
- If your kids' avatars or screen names concern you, talk with them.
- Identities grounded in hatred, violence, illegal activities, or risky sexual behavior should be avoided entirely.
- Ask your kids to think about who they want to be in their online life.
