

The Illinois Assessment of Readiness (IAR) is the new state assessment that replaces PARCC. The IAR will be taken at Lincoln between March 11 and March 21 based on your child's grade. Make-ups will be conducted upon our return from Spring Break.

8th Grade:

(ELA Periods 2-4 and Math Periods 7-8)

6th Grade:

March 14, 15, 18

(Math Periods 3-4 and ELA Periods 7-9)

7th Grade:

(Math Periods 2-3 and ELA Periods 6, 8, 9) Periods 6 & 7 will be flipped for the <u>entire school</u> on these days. Lunch periods are flipped also.

3.0 Using the District-Issued Device at School

The District-issued device is intended for use at school each day. In addition to teacher expectations for device use, school messages, announcements, calendars and schedules may be accessed using the student's G Suite account. Students are responsible for bringing their device to all classes unless instructed otherwise by their teacher(s).

3.1 Devices Left at Home

If a student leaves his/her District-issued device at home or at another location, he or she is responsible for getting his or her coursework completed when reunited with the device.

3.2 Devices Undergoing Repair

Loaner devices will be issued to students for temporary use when their device is undergoing maintenance or repair in the Technology Department. This loaner may be taken to and from home until the repaired device is returned to the student. The student is subject to all District policies, procedures and rules set forth in this handbook and the District's Electronic Network Access/Acceptable Use Policy when using a loaner device.

Student Reminder: Bring your chromebook to school, fully charged, every day.

ASK THE OFFICE LADIES

Question: Could you please tell me again the easiest way to pick up my child during the school day?

Answer: The office requires a parent signature if a child is pulled out during the school day. The EASIEST way is to send a note with your child (with your signature). The student should bring the note to the office BEFORE school and we will issue a pass for the

student to walk out of class, come down to the office, and walk out to your car.

Another simple way is to review the bell schedule with your child and tell them to come to the office during the passing period. The parent can come into the office, meet their child, and sign him out during that passing period.

If you do not know in advance and must remove your child from class, you can come in and we will call the student out of class, but this is not the most efficient nor the least disruptive way to sign out your child.

Also, if you have made arrangements for any other person to pick up your child, we need that information in writing, with the parent signature.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

Good morning, District 57 families,

At last night's School Board meeting, the Board accepted the resignation of Cassie Black, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction. Cassie, who has been working toward earning a law degree and will graduate in May, has been offered a great opportunity to begin practicing law at an educational law firm starting July 1. We are excited for Cassie as she begins this new chapter, and we thank her for her many contributions to the District over the past seven years, both as director of student services and as assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction. We will miss her!

I am very pleased to announce that Dr. Mary Gorr, principal of Westbrook, will be our new assistant superintendent for teaching and learning, effective July 1. The title change (from curriculum and instruction) is a better description of what the job responsibilities entail. During her eight years at Westbrook, Mary has been an innovative educational leader, a mentor to many and a valued PTO and parent partner. She is also loved by the children, both current students and those who attended years ago. I know that many of you will be sad to learn she is leaving the school, but I think all who know her would agree she's an outstanding fit for this position.

We will post the Westbrook principal job and begin the search next week. We plan to form a committee of staff and parent representatives to conduct the first round of interviews. The committee will send two to three finalists to the administrative team for consideration. We hope to present the final candidate to the School Board for approval at the April meeting.

Also at last night's Board meeting, I presented a preview of the 2019-2020 Staffing Plan. The plan is based on enrollment projections for next year and the class sizes that we strive to maintain. Our goal is always to balance student needs with the District's financial constraints, while also maintaining parity between Fairview and Lions Park as much as possible. The Board will vote on the Staffing Plan at the March 21st meeting, and we will share it after that.
